Summary	Tinder is a great dating app to start with to get the feel of online dating. Profiles only take a few minutes to set up and you can start swiping right (to like) or left (to skip) right away. While Tinder has the largest number of users of all dating apps, there is also a lot of fake profiles, scammer profiles, and those not looking for a serious relationship. It can work great if used correctly, you will just have to swipe a lot more to find the jewels in the rough.	Hinge makes starting conversations with matches easy. Every profile consists of pictures, question and answer prompts, voice prompts, and demographic information. Unlike other apps, you do not have to like a person's entire profile, you can like a specific picture or prompt. This allows you to start a conversation with just a like instead of having to wait for the other person to like you back. Typically, Hinge has a good mix of people who are and are not looking for a serious relationship.	Bumble has the same set up as many other dating apps. You swipe left or right on profiles composed of some pictures and a bio. The difference between Bumble and other apps is that once a match is formed, women must message first. If there are no messages within 24 hours, the match expires. This promotes quick conversation. Bumble has a good number of users looking for a serious relationship, but you should expect matches to expire due to the other person not messaging back on a regular basis.	OkCupid is very focused on long term connections. Profiles are very thorough, including pictures and prompts. There are also short answer questions to let potential matches learn more about what's important to you, such as if you are vaccinated, if you have a TV in your bedroom, and if you consider yourself a people person. The app tries to show you matches based on what's important to you, but you can also search for matches near you using the apps many demographic filters.	CoffeeMeetsBagel is a little more complicated than other apps but promises more curated matches. You are only shown limited "bagels", or profiles, every day. The bagels shown to you are based on your preferences as well as your past matches on the app. Once you like one of your bagels, you can start chatting with some recommended icebreakers. This app is designed to create more long-term relationships.	Match is created for individuals looking for a serious relationship. To set up a profile, you answer in-depth questions, including your life goals, habits, and values. You can then choose personality traits you want in a partner, as well as what might be dealbreakers for you. You're shown one profile in your feed at a time which you can like or skip. You can also just search for profiles that the app isn't showing on your main feed.	eHarmony takes about 20 minutes to set up your profile. You take a quiz that asks you a ton of different questions, from serious to fun, to find you matches. The goal is to find you a very compatible match. The downside of eHarmony is it's almost impossible to use the app if you don't pay for it, even though you can sign up for free. eHarmony's users do skew a bit older than other apps, but there are plenty of people on there of all ages in largely populated areas.

There are many more dating apps out there that are not mentioned above. There are ones solely based on religion, ethnicity, sexual orientation, as well as exclusive apps which you must apply to.
